DX 40 Years Ago – February 1961

As I write this, D68C is blasting the ether on 10 CW in the background. Timely, as

this month in '68 the only active Comoroes station, FH8CD was going QRT. Also very timely, what with the current YK9A DXpedition active and easily logged from this area, was the announcement that Rasheed, YK1AA, was then QRV on the low end of 20 meters. (Note, the low end of U.S. 20 phone at that time was 14.200 and there was a lot of unreachable juicy DX below that.) This month South Yeman was reported to have received the call sign block 80A to 80Z. A very happy W1BB, of 160 Meter fame, collected WAC on 160 meters by working KA9AK in Japan. Pitcairn Island just became a little easier to work as Tom Christian, VR6TC, now on 15 SSB every Monday afternoon with QSL Manager W4TAJ on frequency logging. At this time the DX population is waiting for Qatar, MP4, to come up as a new one. OD5BZ reports he was in MP4 land, had a license, security clearance but lacked the needed Political clearance. Translated, that means he cannot afford to pay the needed *tribute*. While waiting for all that to clear, the gang had enough to work with tidbits like 5U7AL/TY at Dahomey Republic, YA1TNC, Kabul in Afganistan, ZD9BE at Tristan Da Cunha and Fanning Island, VR3DY, by KH6GLU. RFI Swat Team

Recently, W2TZ and K1PY have had RFI with close proximity neighbors. The W2TZ case involved RF getting into a stereo amplifier through a number of lengthy speaker leads. The interference was strongest on 10m and decreased with frequency to the point that no interference could be heard on 40 meters. The interference was independent of the amplifier volume control setting. The problem at K1PY mainly involved RFI getting into a VCR, wiping out the picture when playing a tape. At least for low power, the problem at both stations was resolved by placing a number of split, snap-on ferrite core beads on the input leads to the stereo amplifier and the VCR. For the stereo amplifier about seven

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beads were necessary in each of the longer speaker leads. Without getting into details, a similar larger number were required on leads going into the VCR. The split beads were easy to install and are just great technology for resolving RFI problems. The Ferrite Split Beads, made of 43 ferrite, were obtained from Surplus Sales of Nebraska, although they could be purchased from Palomar or Amidon Associates. Palomar has a very good. well-written RFI Tip Sheet, which could be requested at the Palomar web site. I obtained a copy and gave it to my neighbor because it explains in very simple language, that the cores don't damage or degrade the performance of the equipment. It is a very good sheet to promote communications and neighbor relations. So, the bad news is RFI is where you find it, but the good news is that when you find it, ferrite cores do a great job at minimizing or reducing the RFI without even minor surgery on the equipment involved.
