Field Day Planning and Needs

Field Day! Field Day is June 28 and 29 and setup is June 27. Mark your calendars now.

Field Day is probably the culmination of the RDXA calendar year, and a time when members again have the opportunity to work sideby-side at one location in a team effort. Two years ago RDXA made first place in the 3A category and we are returning to the 3A category this year. Unlike two years ago a GOTA station will replace the now defunct Novice station, so we have been making new plans concerning the GOTA station.

The basic layout at Webster Park will almost be the same as in previous years. The antenna set-up will be simple, consisting mostly of wire antennas. The traditional SSB station will operate 40 SSB and 75 SSB. Antennas will be 2el wire beams on each band. The second station will operate mainly 20 SSB and 20 and 80 CW using the TA33 tribander and 80m dipole on the flag pole using the legendary GIZMO-1. The 40 CW station will operate mainly CW during the daylight hours, but will have the option to operate 40 SSB when the SSB station goes to 75 SSB about 20:30. When on 40 SSB the 40m station can only "run" stations – no S&P allowed due to no logging networking with the SSB station to dupe check QSOs. All 40 SSB results will be combined after Field Day. This is a new approach intended to help out the 40 CW station at night when rates are slow.

The GOTA station will be used primarily as a RTTY station using an all band dipole. This should hopefully attract some computer enthusiasts into amateur radio.

We don't know what to expect in terms of station-to-station interference, but we hope to do some Saturday morning testing to try to resolve any problems. Bonus point activities are again a major need this year. Hopefully individuals who helped with these last year will step-up and do them again this year.

We have two rigs lined up for the 3A stations, but still need a rig for the 80/20 station and a rig with RTTY accessories for the GOTA station.

We need generators except for the SSB station.

Additional ropes for antennas as well as the many accessories needed at each station are needed.

The VHF station has been in the capable hands of N2OPW in previous years, and WB2JMH last year. *The VHF station will need help and operators*.

As is always the case, many details will have to be worked out before the event. If you can help fill any FD slots, please contact us. All help is appreciated.

Rochester Hamfest 2003

Maybe it'll actually feel like Spring by the time the Rochester Hamfest comes along at the end of the month. Sheeeesh, Spring. Like or not, it's nearly Hamfest time, so get ready. RDXA will join with the RVHFG again this year up in the old Grassy Knoll area, same as last year. We gave up fighting the computer guy for turf down along the intersection of the main road and the side road to the old racetrack. Two years ago we were there Monday noon before the Hamfest and he'd already staked out his area. Guess he didn't like us grabbing the corner the year before that on Tuesday. Besides not having to fight for the (former) Grassy Knoll area, there are added advantages of better parking, no threat of flooding, and the opportunity to develop the area as a "Club Row" along with the .79 folks and others.

We're going to try a slightly modified layout to enable easier access for folks to stop in, say hi, and have a little chat. More like the former times on the Grassy Knoll where we had nearly continuous roundtables going on, and lots of folks would drop in. There will be no sign saying so, but we'd like our area to look and feel like the "RDXA Hospitality Area." Bring chairs!

It's usually not a problem, but just to make sure, we need a number of people to buy a Flea Market "vendor" pass (at \$10) to ensure that we have enough "spots" to justify the space we will be claiming ahead of time. And, over and above everyone else, you get access to the RDXA/RVHFG VIP Parking Area! Just having a close-by parking space on the grass behind the guard rail is worth it. And just think how much closer it will be to bring that new heavy transceiver or amplifier you just bought.

Speaking of parking, everybody, whether you're selling or not, **has** to park behind the guard rail. Vehicles use up way too much space, make access difficult, are susceptible to scratching, the list goes on. Besides, if you don't, you may find a guy rope for the club tent shelters tied to your bumper.

We'll have the club tables set up for casual selling. They will be on either side of the front "entrance" to the sit-down social area. The only rule for selling stuff is label each item with your call and the price. If you're not around, we'll negotiate it for you – "It says \$100? I'm sure he'll take 10." Maybe you want to put a minimum or a firm price on it!

If you plan on major selling (where you need your vehicle), come on by Thursday afternoon and stake out a spot right across the way so you can be close by. That'll keep you in touch with the group, and provide you with occasional helpers to watch things. And besides, that's now when the 'real hamfest' actually starts. So even if you're not selling, if you are able, come on by on Thursday afternoon, help set up the shelters, watch the fairgrounds fill up, and of course, relax with the group and a cool one.

We're planning on continuing the tradition of having burgers and hots at noon on both Friday and Saturday. A few additional helpers would be appreciated to make a short run or two for supplies to the Wegmans across the street. Now how convenient can that be, huh? So be ready to step forward, or we'll make you cook instead. As usual, if you want something in particular, bring it. Also some bags of chips, pretzels, and other goodies would be nice – if you happen to be at the market a few days before, grab something to bring to the 'fest.

Also (here's the important part that you thought I forgot about), we'll continue the even older tradition of having smooth, cold, beverages available. Up until recently we went with a keg, but going with cans last year proved to work out pretty well, so we think it'll be the same this year – much less hassle in getting it (never mind returning it), greater variety, no cups, very portable, no waste, and you can take home the leftovers. I know, I know, it

ain't the same, it doesn't have the aura, but it still does the job. And **cans** not bottles, please.

That's the basics. We might develop more between now and the 'fest, but regardless, it's always a great time. Plan on being there, even if you're not buying or selling or shopping or whatever – just to be part of the camaraderie. It's one of the best parts of radio in Rochester for the whole year. Propagation	AD5Q's notes from Cycle 22, May 1992
Solar Flux Range	99 – 145

General – May is an especially good month for DX. My DXing career began in the mid-60s at a sunspot bottom, and it was then that I learned about the high nighttime MUFs that characterize conditions in late spring. The fine night path propagation we find on 20m for most of the year does not exist at the low end of the cycle. In late spring we get a break from the DX doldrums, and 20m opens in the evening over the difficult polar paths we now take for granted. At the peak of the cycle these same seasonal effects turn 15m into an excellent night path band – without diminishing the its effectiveness across day paths. The variety of DX paths that open at this time of year is astonis hing. There is a major event at the end of May that enables contesters to exploit 15 meters at the peak of its season: the WPX CW.

Polar openings can occur at any hour of the day, and these openings are deep into Asia. European openings occur most of the day, with great evening openings where you can follow the sunrise across Europe (as with any nighttime band.) Morning long path should be watched for rare African countries. Good openings to the Middle East can occur in late afternoon and evening.

10 Meters – The 10 meter season is basically over, and DXers not in tune with propagation's seasonal cycle are somehow surprised. Some point to the drop in sunspot activity in past months. Propagationists who primarily watch the solar flux charts are expecting a rapid drop in solar activity over the coming year, and they are probably right. We have enjoyed a broad cycle peak, but it is nearly over. Make the best of 10 meters this fall. The poor conditions in the next several months will be seasonal.

20 Meters – 20m is great in the morning, with pipeline conditions to the Far East and long path to the Indian Ocean and Africa. Have I said this before? Please understand that I have been writing this propagation article for over four years, and am running out of material. Future articles in NARS NEWS may occasionally be devoted to other subjects, such as antennas. It is hoped that readers find these upcoming articles as informative as this series on propagation.

TA, **Turkey** – Andy, G3AB (ex-G4ZVJ), will be active as TA3/G3AB in the CQ WPX CW Contest as a Single-Op (possibly Single Band) entry. QSL via G3AB.

TO5, Martinique – Jack, RW3QC, will be active as TO5AA, in the CQWW WPX CW Contest (May 24-25th) as an All Band/High Power entry. Activity will be from FM5BH's QTH. The QSL Manager has not been chosen yet.

V63, Micronesia – Operators Funaki/JA7ZP, Takao/JA7AGO and Sho/VA7HMZ will be active from Pohnpei (**OC-010**) May 12-15th as V63ZP, V63GO and V63DX respectively. Activity will be 40-10 meters CW/SSB. QSL via their home callsign (Bureau OK).

VI8, Australia (Special Event) – The Darwin Amateur Radio Club of the Northern Territory, Australia, will be operating a special event station with the callsign of VI8NT to celebrate 25 years of self government. The station will be opened officially on the 1st of July 2003 (Northern Territory Day) and run until the 31st December 2003. This special Amateur Radio callsign VI8NT is allowed to be used by any licensed VK8 Amateur. Only one Amateur will hold the callsign at any one time, meaning only one station on air at a time. A special QSL card is being made up by the QSL Manager Neil, VK6NE. All QSLs will be accepted directly or via the Bureau.

VP2, Montserrat – Three members of the Florida DXpedition Group are "On the Road Again"! Operators Bill W4WX/VP2MHX, William/N2WB and Bob/K9MDO (both waiting on VP2M callsign) will be here July 22-29th. They will have three Kenwood TS-570D stations and will be active on most bands and modes. QSL via their homecalls, CBA. N2WB via QSL Manager N2OO.

VP9, Bermuda – Merv, N6NO, will be active as N6NO/VP9 from May 14-21st. His activity will be on 80-10 meters, possibly 160, with a 100w and a focus on CW. His operating times will favor the difficult Asia/Oceania path. QSL via N6NO.

VQ9, Chagos Island – Larry, VQ9LA, has been very active on 20 meters RTTY. Watch around 14083-14090 kHz beginning around 2200z. Larry will be there for about year.

XU, Cambodia – Jaak, ES1FB, informs OPDX that he will once again return to Shianoukville, and operate as XU7ACE for about 10 days starting May 11th. Activity will be on 40-6 meters, mostly SSB. He plans to activate IOTA **AS-133** on May 17-18th, but this depends on the weather condition (It is the rainy season now). XW, LAOS – Champ, E21EIC, will be back in Laos around June 3-23rd and will be active as XW1IC. His activity will be on 160-10 meters, including the WARC bands using only 100 watts. He states the modes he will use are CW/SSB/RTTY and 2 meter FM (Maybe 6 meters if possible). Champ will also be active in the All Asian DX Contest. QSL via E21EIC.

YO, Romania [*I don't mean YAO! Ed.*] – Jean-Michel, F6AJA, will once again be YO/F6AJA (10th year consecutively) from Suceava (450Km north of Bucarest) from May 19-28th. He will be on the air when time permit from the Silviu station YO8FZ.

YV4, Venezuela – Dario, YV4GMG, in Santa Cruz, informs OPDX that he is active on 160 meters and 6 meters (on 50110 kHz), as well as 20/15/10 meters. On HF, he can also be active on PSK31/SSTV/RTTY/MMT63/AMTOR. QSL via his home callsign. Also, active from the same station is Hector/YV4GMH and Maria/YV4GMB.

Z38, Macedonia – Lothar/DJ7ZG and Babs/DL7AFS will once again be on tour. This time they will be active from here using the callsign Z38Z. They hope to be active starting on May 15th for about 10 days. Activity will be on 160-6 meters, mainly on RTTY, PSK and SSB. Lot informs/states to OPDX, "Due to the request of many Hams from America and Japan we want to work these countries particularly." QSL via DL7AFS. The Telegraphic Apprentice

Jerry Newton was employed with Western Union in San Antonio, Texas. He published dozens of telegraphic poems in a book in 1902. Though the family was living in Arkansas, he joined the Union Army service in Indiana, working as a telegrapher with Co. H, 1st Regiment, Indiana Cavalry, mostly in the Arkansas region.

His older brother Edward (1845-1923) joined the Confederate Army as a telegrapher, Co. H, 8 Arkansas Cavalry. After the war he ran the Little Rock WU office. Charles Newton (1855-1901), a second brother, worked as telegrapher at the Frankfort, KY office.

Jerry worked for WU from after the Civil War to around 1910. He pounded brass in Arkansas, Houston, TX and San Antonio, with perhaps some other stops in between. The following poem was written just after the turn of the century.

My Experience as an Apprentice by Jerry Newton

(Scene, Little Rock Western Union Office, 1868.)

When left in charge one day at noon Alone, to hold the fort, I felt a yearning, uncontrolled To tackle noon report.

Some occult power kept pricking me, Which I could not subdue, With alternating joy and fear My courage came and flew.

Sun-clad fancies gleamed so bright Of honors and of fame, But my verdancy was tristful 'Fore welcome 30 came.

'Twas up to me; L. R. was called, This gave my nerves a "jar," A chilly rigor seized me, when I answer'd, I. I. L. R.

I started up my register, The paper went askew, I broke - with waning confidence But started up anew.

The sender was an artist rare, And forty words at least Per minute, he was sending, and It seemed his speed increasd.

The moments kept on lengthening out, Each filled with fears galore, By desperation goaded on, I tore my hair and swore.

I mopped the cold beads from my brow, As dots and dashes flew, And like a piece of marble stood With face of livid hue.

Six hundred yards of paper soon was reeled off on the floor, Oh! phantoms of that fateful day Will haunt me evermore.

Though five and thirty years have gone, My locks with gray are strewn, I see myself in Little Rock Taking press report at noon.
