Directions to Field Day site:

RDXA Field Day is held at the campgrounds in Webster Park in Webster NY.

Proceed straight, even after the road turns to dirt. When you enter a clearing, there will be a parking area to the right -- you're there!

Reflections on FD 2003

Well, because of the inside booth at the HamFest and the Field Day planning meeting (still to come at the time of writing), you're spared the 100-page K1JUL/K1PY Field Day history that I joked with Raj that I'd submit.

FD has been the one constant in my radio "career." For years and years I didn't even own a radio at all. But I'd

always join all the other hams across the country who came out of the proverbial woodwork for Field Day.

It started with my first club while in high school -- EARS, the Exeter (N.H.) Amateur Radio Society. Now this was a young club, unlike most you see today. This club was primarily high school-aged kids. Our oldest non-school member was probably in his late twenties! We went to an abandoned fire-watch tower, on a hill of course, but right behind the QTH of a real radio Old-Timer, a broadcast engineer at a radio station, who became a club mentor. There were no transceivers back then folks -- these separate receivers and transmitters all glowed in the dark and weighed a ton (each)!

Then there were a couple 2-person FDs at a camp on a lake up towards N.H.'s White Mountains. And yes, mountains high, lake low, contacts few.

A memorable hiatus was with a few guys from the Port City Club (Portsmouth, N.H.) that formed a little group called the Southport Island Field Day, Marching, and Chowder Society. This was up in Kennebunkport, Maine, on of course, Southport Island. The camp was right over the bridge to the island -- the turning bridge, that rotated 90-degrees to let boats through the channel with the mainland. And just across the street from the Lobster House. The place where at 6 p.m. on Saturday, 4 hours into Field Day operating, we'd shut down, march down the hill to the Lobster House, and have our traditional chowder and boiled lobsters (picked fresh from the salt-water tanks). The actual lobster boats that got them were at the pier next to our table. This is down-home real New England guys!

Those days ended when I moved to Nashua, N.H., and became co-founder (with another Vic) of NARC, the Nashua Area Radio Club. This is the club now famous for its 28A Field Days and stacked mono-banders on 70-foot towers using the call N1FD. But it started more traditionally, going to the top of some nearby mountain (easy to do in N.H.) It was great -- mornings found the peak fog-shrouded, you could pick wild blueberries, and at the end of the day watch the sun set over another mountain.

We moved back to Nashua ultimately and got a lot fancier and better. That was when the multiple towers started I remember operating the 40M station with a 40-2CD Cushcraft at 70-feet, passing the time with guest operator HL9KW (yes HL). This club has real character, and some real characters! For example, one member who had real flair would introduce Sunday breakfast by serving Bloody Mary's while attired in a velvet smoking jacket! He ultimately went on to become ARRL Division Director. Things were good. And ultimately we won 4A.

In 1984 we moved to Rochester. Excited to find a HUGE club, I couldn't imagine what their FD would be like. Shocked that neither could they, I was quite fortunate to discover RDXA. Harriet Hollister Spencer State Park was my introduction to FD WNY-style. The most noteworthy thing about those early RDXA Field Days was my 10-year old daughter Kellie's desire to go along with Dad for these special weekends. What an honor that was for me! And to justify it, she even got her Novice ticket, and became the sole operator of our first Novice FD station, using her call KB2CHC.

To draw more of the membership that wasn't thrilled with a 45-minute or longer drive to the FD site, we relocated to the Ridge Shelter at Webster Park. This definitely worked out better, and was the start of the current RDXA FD tradition. And the rest is

Contesting and DXing from the past February 1983 Ed, K2MP

On the local scene the RDXA meeting then was held at the Colonial Hotel on Empire Blvd. The February program was a film on the N2AA Contest team showing their Multi-op effort during the past CQWW DX contest. The RDXA newsletter was a hand written, one pager, Xeroxed and mailed with a first class 20 cent stamp. "News" from the newsletter revealed that Jeff, W2HPF, was the FD Chairman and was seeking participants and KB2SE was looking for support to run a 160 meter club effort.

On-the-air then was Heard Island, Syria with YK1AO, Kerguelen as FB8XAB and Franz Joseph Land as UK1PGO. QST published the list of Sponsors for the upcoming DX Contests. Shown there was the Rochester DX Assn sponsoring the W/VE Phone QRP award.

Also from the pages of QST was a list of IARU Champions. From Western NY the only local top scorer was Ron Roach, W2FUI. The new 30 meter band is now available, but, as warned by ARRL President Vic Clark, W4KFC, on a shared basis. This means that Amateur activity is secondary and no harmful interference can be caused to primary users.

QST reports that many are having problems getting QSL's from Iraq's YI1BGD. It is suggested that two dollars and an SASE might work. (Nothing changes – Ed)

The "hot" radios on the market were Kenwood's TS-930, ICOM's IC-740 and Drake's TR-7, all solid state. Yaesu's FT-102, in the same kilo-buck price range, featured three 6146 final tubes. Yaesu, as we know, would eventually catch up! KLM introduced their KT-34XA.
