Membership Biographies -Paul Meyers

N2OPW

I was first licensed in 1991 at the ripe old age of 48. Sure I had an interest in Ham Radio back when I was a Boy Scout. I remember crystal sets and trying to learn Morse Code, but without an Elmer the interest just wasn't strong enough. I grew up, got a BSEE from RIT, and got married to Terry 40 years ago, and had two sons, John and Chris, long before the real interest in Ham Radio got the best of me. Terry is now a retired Social Worker, John is a Civil Engineer in Boston MA with Dianne and three of my grandchildren and Chris owns his own architectural firm in Columbus OH with Carole and my other four grandchildren.

I was first licensed as a Technician because there was not a code requirement. After a while I struggled through and passed 5WPM and upgraded to Tech +. Later I took the General test and waited almost a year for the rules to change to reduce the code requirement to only 5 WPM. Then in one session I processed the paperwork to become a General and passed the Extra exam.

My first rig was a borrowed Radio Shack HTX-202 2M HT and I developed an interest in 2m weak signal when I picked up a KLM 2000 2M rig but I quickly upgraded to an ICOM IC-706. I joined the RVHFG because of my interest in all the technical aspects of ham radio, and spent many years on their BOD and as their Treasurer. I tried contesting once at N2PA and was convinced to become a rover along with Jeff, K2EHF. We roved for many years and once achieved #6 in the US for the ARRL January VHF Sweepstakes. I feel that most non-hams can understand and are more impressed with HF world wide DX than squares and the understanding grid technical achievements like VUCC on 10 Ghz.

Along the way my interest turned more to HF and contesting. I joined RDXA and served on their BOD for many years. I have an interest in antenna construction and RTTY contesting and I have upgraded my rig again and now have an ICOM IC-765. I enjoy multi-op contesting and have been on the **K2NNY** team for numerous ARRL SSB Sweepstakes Contests and the **W2CCC** team for the IARU HF World championship contests. Field Day is another activity that I have often participated in as the VHF team captain. I currently am a member in six radio clubs, RDXA, RVHFG, RTTY Rangers W2RTY, K2NNY, W2CCC, and KB1PNP.

I was very much honored last month at the RVHF, RDXA W2RDX/60 banquet to be presented with the **KE2WK** Memorial Award.

For me, later this year, will be a scheduled move to Columbus Ohio to be closer to some of the grandchildren and hopefully a tower and a beam to up my DX country count.

Forecast of Solar and Geomagnetic Activity 07 May - 02 June 2008

Solar activity is expected to be very low.

No proton events are expected at geosynchronous orbit. The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to reach high levels during 07 - 08 May, 21 - 28 May, and 01 - 02 June. Geomagnetic field activity is expected to be at quiet to unsettled levels 07 - 12 May. On 13 May, a recurrent coronal hole high speed stream is expected to increase activity levels to unsettled to active conditions. Activity levels are expected to decline to quiet to unsettled levels 14 - 18 May. Conditions should increase to unsettled to active, with a chance for minor storm levels at middle latitudes and major storm periods at high latitudes on 19 - 21 May, due to a recurrent coronal hole high speed stream. On 22 May, activity levels should abate to quiet to unsettled levels until 26 May. Recurrent high speed streams are expected to increase activity again to unsettled to active levels for 27 May - 02 June.

AD5Q's notes from Cycle 22

May 1997 Forecast

Flux Range 70-85

20 Meters continues to improve. The evening openings are great, especially if you like running CW Russians. This path follows the post-sunrise area across Siberia and Russia to Eastern Europe and Scandinavia. Around midnight the polar path closes, but signals continue to come through from the west.

On 20 CW, westerly signals from the Pacific, Australia and New Zealand are hardly numerous enough to keep the band jumping with DX activity. Most amateurs in these areas are primarily SSB ops, just as most in Russia and Eastern Europe prefer CW. When paths are open both over the pole and to VK/ZL, an SSB operator on 20 will find most DX activity to the west, while the CW op will more likely notice a band that is wall-to-wall with that sound we all know and love: polar warble. In the late evening, the westerly opening expands as signals cross the darkness back into daylight where it is late afternoon. If the band were to stay open well past midnight (assisted by an extra 10 or 20 points of solar flux), the late afternoon region would approach Asia and a path to Japan would open up nicely. Some excellent runs in past WPX contests come to mind.

In the morning we find good openings over high latitude paths into Asia. Here we routinely work JT, BV, VS6, HS, 9V, V85, etc. while tuning and wishing for signals even more exotic (9N, A5, VU4, XW). This morning pipeline does not last long, but is changing as summer approaches.

At the high end of the solar cycle, we notice a deterioration in 10 Meter conditions during May due to a heating and thinning of the ionosphere that lowers the MUF; effecting 15 Meters in midsummer and forcing most DX activity down to 20. At the low end of the cycle we have already written off 10 and 15 anyway, and should notice that the effect of this summer heating on 20 Meters is beneficial. It keeps the MUF hovering above 14 MHz for most of the morning, lengthening the duration of our opening into the Asian evening darkness. During our own evening, we work into this same broad area of morning as it spans Russia and Siberia. Instead of a narrow pipeline into a sunrise area, a large region of a remote continent is workable - improving QSO rates in the CW WPX beyond what would be expected at the low end of a sunspot cycle.

Thus, 20 Meters will continue its transition to this summer configuration. The main opening to Europe will be in the late afternoon; working into their late evening window to the west before the band closes for them.

Other bands? 40 is still in excellent shape with rising QRN levels (and low band contacts count double in the WPX). I would expect that conditions on 30 are even better, but I have yet to find room for a serious antenna on any WARC band and claim no expertise. http://www.gth.com/ad5g/

Reflector Tips & Tricks

K2DB

Do you have more than one e-mail address? Do you sometimes forget to look at which account you are using? It's really easy to do. Here's a tip to help you out!

Q - How can I post from 2 or more addresses to a "members-only" list?

A - Our RDXA list is restricted to "members-only", meaning if you post from an address that isn't a member of the list, the message is held for moderator's approval. Members-only lists are increasingly popular because they reduce the amount of spam seen by the list.

The problem is for people who want to post to the list from two or more addresses, but only want one of those addresses to receive list postings.

For example:

I sometimes post to the list from K2db@k2db.org and sometimes as paul@paulmackanos.com or paul@ProHomeInspector.net. I'd like all the postings to be treated as coming from a list member, but I don't want duplicates of list messages; I only want k2db@k2db.org to get the messages.

The solution for this is to actually subscribe all addresses to the list, but to disable delivery from all but one of the addresses. So in the above example, I'd subscribe k2db@k2db.org, paul@paulmackanos.com and paul@ProHomeInspector.net but, I would disable delivery to paul@paulmackanos.com and paul@ProHomeInspector.net You can disable delivery to an address by going to the List Options page for that address and setting "Mail delivery" to "disabled".

If you do not feel comfortable doing this, just send me an email and I will go into the list and change it for you.

Also, do not subscribe with your callsign@arrl,net account. That is only for receiving mail, and you do not actually send mail from that account, so the list will not be able to handle it. It will bounce it as a posting from a non-member.

I hope this takes some of the confusion out of using the list.

Because no one figured a dog would be eavesdropping, I was one of their most valuable spies for eight years. Copying high speed CW all day really tired me and I knew I wasn't getting any younger. So, I decided to settle down. I retired from the CIA (8 dog years is 56 CIA years) and joined a ham radio club. In fact I won first place in the Iowa QSO Party two years in a row. Then I had a mess of puppies and got away from Ham Radio for a while. I sure miss my radio. Why don't you buy me and I'll be your CW operator in the next DX 'test ..."

I said "let me see what I can do."

I went back in and asked the owner what he wanted for the dog.

"Ten dollars," the old farmer says.

"Ten dollars? This dog is amazing! Why on earth are you selling him so cheap?"

"Because he's a liar. He never did any of that stuff. He's just a No Code General."

Revamping the Shack

N2CK

I recently invested some effort in revamping the shack. Specifically, I ran a dedicated 240V line for the amp. Previously I ran all the shack components (HF rig, computer, monitor, amplifier, and other station accessories) off one wall plug. I believe the household computer located 3' away was also running off the same circuit. Can you say overload? Previously, I was prevented from running a dedicated line because I had no open positions in the panel box. I suspected the household machine was on the same circuit when shortly after the new panel was installed, I had both the household and shack computers on – as well as the rig. Hearing a station I wanted to work, I snapped on the amp. Hearing both computers shut down, I realized that proved to be the final load on the 120 volt circuit using the new panel. I visited the panel box, and popped the breaker back into place. This makes me wonder just how much current was flowing though the old breaker on this circuit.

In anticipation of doing some kitchen work, I lobbied to spend the money to upgrade the service – in part because I knew we were going to need some 20A dedicated lines in the kitchen, but also because I wanted to get the amp running on 240. I knew what I was using was a significant overload on the circuit, as turning on the amp caused the (new) breaker to pop.

A little bit of shopping at the local big box store, I came away with a 20 amp double pole breaker, and a spool of 12 gauge wire. I put my youngest son to work helping me get everything wired up (he's going to school to be an electrician).

Once we got everything wired up, I opened the amp (a Heathkit SB-200) and set the jumpers for 240 volt operation. **K2DB** has repeatedly told me how much more power I would see out of the amp once it was running on 240. Actually, I don't see much of a difference in the output on my watt meter. One thing I do notice is the light above the station doesn't flicker to the beat of a CW signal anymore.

Knowing I would probably be using the amp more often I decided to investigate cooling options. To those who haven't seen my shack, I built a shelf arrangement to augment the little surface space I have on the desk. The amp tucks into a compartment with little room to spare. There is a mere 2 ³/₄ inches of clearance above the amp. A while ago, **N2OPW** gave me a small 120 volt muffin fan. To make it more convenient, I wanted to hard-wire it to the plug. Additionally, I needed to elevate it slightly from the cabinet. If you look close at the picture, you'll see some rubber feet I attached to the bottom of the fan (found at a local big box place as well). The feet are ~3/8", and the fan 1 ¹/₂ inches tall. This gives me just under an inch of clearance at the top. I positioned the fan so it blows up, pulling the hot air from the amp.



I stumbled across an even neater solution for mounting the switch. As I looked around for some scrap sheet metal or Plexiglas to mount the switch, I found a microphone mounting bracket. Hmmmm, I pondered. I bent the center tab back and broke it off. I then filed the opening between the 2 prongs just a little, and presto - I have a mounting bracket for my switch! I mounted the bracket to the shelf arrangement in a convenient, out of the way location with a couple pan head sheet metal screws. Now when ever I use the amp for an extended period of time, I can operate safely current-draw wise, and also vent some warm air from the amplifier.




