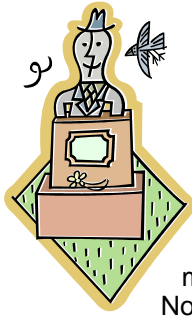

Making it to The Dance

The energy generated by this year's Field Day is definitely palpable in the club! People have varying degrees of competitiveness that they bring to any activity, but regardless of that, whatever level you're at is surely heightened by this year's attempt to make it to The Dance again. As outstanding as last year's results were, it's going to take even more to fend off the current 3A record holders and chief competition, the Cortek Radio Assn, **W9CA**.

With what's been unfolding so far, it's looking quite promising!

Lynn **W2BSN**, Roy **W3RLW**, and Duncan **K2OEQ** made another inventory of the AWA Mil-mast hardware, and determined that with the purchase of just a couple of items, found to be available at Ontario Surplus, a third Mil-mast could be put together, and could even be extended to 65 feet!

Also at the **AWA**, the Mil-mast and GOTA A4 that has been up since last fall were taken down, packaged up, and transported to the antenna staging area at **K1PY's**. Thanks go to Ed **K2MP**, Larry **W2LB**, Doug **N2BEG** and son **Jack**, Roy **W3RLW** and AWA member Gib **KC2JTU** for the takedown.

Also at Vic's thanks to Larry **W2LB**, Tom **WD8CQB**, and Fred **W2TZ**, is Fred's Force12 40M 2 element Yagi, a little 80 pound antenna which is intended to upgrade the Phone station on that band.

Lloyd **N2PU** has again secured the **Monroe County Office of Emergency Management** "100 foot" motorized crankup tower! That little beauty is deemed to have been a key factor in our success last year. Great to have it back again and many thanks to **Muffy Meisenzahl** and the Office of Emergency Management.



The shocker and "new thing" for this year is the very likely availability of either an 85 or 120 foot articulated arm or telescoping boom through a very generous loan from **Rich DiMarco II** at **Admar Supply Company!** Of course we

recognize Admar from their many years of providing us, through the efforts of Dick **N2QKL**, with the use of their 25 kW diesel generators that have regularly provided super quiet and reliable service. (Remember the days of manually refueling multiple rope-start generators located down the road to the Boy Scout cabins?!!) The delegation of Lloyd **N2PU**, Paul **K2DB**, and Vic **K1PY** had all they could do to stay in their chairs when this all fell into place. Many thanks to Rich and Admar. This will be used also to upgrade the Phone station and support the Force12 40M beam, plus the 75M dipole. Hopefully it's the 120 footer – apparently it's more likely than the 85, but we'll see.

And believe it or not, there's much more going on in various initiatives.

Since food is often not far from many minds, we're again fortunate to be able to offer **The Field Day Weekend Package**, highlighted again this year by Saturday dinner and Sunday breakfast. Kevin **N2VJB** is again on board and going traditional with a Spaghetti & Meatball dinner with salad, garlic bread, and dessert – if in season, dessert will be shortcake with fresh strawberries and whipped cream.

Not to be outdone, the Sunday Chefs switch roles this year with Pam **K2PAM** taking over as lead chef with Rick **W1TY** relegated to an appropriately subserviant role. ☺ The menu has been posted on the reflector, and in itself is something to behold.

Andy **K0SM** is grabbing on to the satellite bonus with a vengeance, looking to add contacts above and beyond the 100 point bonus. He'll also be Beta testing a new **Green Heron Engineering** controller that Jeff **W2FU** is developing – it'll be cool just to see that. We also have to thank Jeff for the loan of a number of band pass filters for each station to eliminate RF interference. We're still not sure what caused the RFI to the 20M CW station last year, so we're taking a number of steps to preclude it from happening again.

As you've heard, the GOTA station can generate big points, and we have an effort this year to squeeze every last one of them out and onto the bottom line. Employing the "generally inactive" qualification for GOTA ops, Irv **AF2K**, Lloyd **N2PU**, and Paul **K2DB** have invited a number of truly inactive ops who just happen to still be good CW ops, in spite of their lack of on-air activity. And per Dan Henderson **N1ND**, the author of the Field Day rules and our guest at the Dinosaur the Friday before the Hamfest, this is exactly in the spirit of that rule – "*We just want to get people on the air.*" We intend to capitalize on that, and just as we're quite sure our friends at W9CA do, generate 500 CW contacts for the GOTA log, providing us with the double points that CW gives you. This is NOT to rule out the use of the GOTA station by our own members who'd just like to make a couple contacts at a little slower pace – the plan is to complete the maximum bonus-qualified 500 contacts by Saturday night, leaving all of overnight (midnight on) and Sunday for "casual operating."



Another place that we'll employ CW is to take advantage of certain operating periods when three bands are wide open and ripe for running. One of these is when 20, 40, and 80 all are hot in the early to late evening. Again, since CW makes double the points of phone, the phone station will switch modes and become 80 CW while the 80/20 CW station continues to mine the 20M band until much later. So for those overlap periods, we'll be making CW points on 3 instead of 2 bands. We're also figuring that when we get back to phone, we'll be all that much more in demand and will be able to maintain higher rates – especially with the improved antennas!

Bill **K2TER** is looking, as always, to make the best out of VHF with yet more improvements. As last year, he owns the top of the county tower, and has plans for new and improved antennas. There will also be attempts at activity hours and to get the local VHF community to participate.

In line with that, RDXA is promoting a **Field Day Open House** that will be run by Carolyn **N2YPM** on Sunday morning, 9-noon. Having folks come by and see our awesome Field Day operation and see what it takes to be national champions is one reason for holding this. We're hoping that a side benefit will be these folks bringing their radios and giving us contacts while they're on site – something they probably couldn't or wouldn't be inclined to do from home.

With all this, I think it's quite clear we're going to have a phenomenal Field Day! What it takes to work is YOU coming out and just enjoying the whole experience! With the scope of the effort, there will be lots to do, and the best way to experience something is to take part, not just watch. So don't be reluctant to step up – we really do

NEED you to do so, and by doing so, enjoying yourself even more. Hey, how many can claim to have taken part in national championship efforts?!! Be part of it, and get us to **The Big Dance!**

Your Opinion for the DXAC

K2CS

Please find below comments generated by the DXAC and it's members pertaining to "digital" mode based awards.

If you would, please direct constructive comments to me as I'll be compiling them for my report.

Hello RDXA Members and fellow Atlantic Division DXers, During a recent ARRL Programs and Services Committee meeting (PSC) there were discussions concerning the current DXCC award structure as it pertains to the RTTY Award and other digital services.

As a little background, the RTTY DXCC award was created in July 1976 as a non-endorsable award. QSOs could be dated back to 1945. In July 1984 the award became endorsable. In December 1993 the RTTY award became an Honor Roll award. Since then the ARRL has allowed the newer digital modes to all be credited to the original RTTY award. It is not likely that ARRL will eliminate the RTTY DXCC as it stands now, but possibly replace it with a separate award.

The ARRL PSC has now asked the DX Advisory Committee to consider recommendations of other digital modes in the DXCC program thus several questions are presented below for your comment.

- 1) Do you feel new digital awards (endorsable or not) for additional modes need to be created?
- 2) Do you feel the current RTTY award should be endorsed by mode?
- 3) Do you feel renaming the current RTTY Award to a DIGITAL Award and leaving the rest unchanged would be an acceptable change?
- 4) Your thoughts on start dates for any futures awards.

5) Your thoughts on present and future band planning for Digital services.

6) Your thoughts on how possible award changes could impact future DXpeditions.

Administrative impact that any new awards might have at ARRL Headquarters should not be considered in your recommendations.

As the ARRL DXAC Representative to the Atlantic Division, I will consolidate comments and recommendations and forward to our DXAC Chairman, **K4UEE**, for his report to the PSC. Please have any comments to me by mid July 2009.

The Barnard Fire Department, who own and manage the property, staffed the concession and cooked the food, the service was fast and the food was excellent. The banquet was well attended, with a buffet of fish, beef tips, chicken, pasta and a couple side dishes. Everyone enjoyed the variety and the food was great! The banquet was a great way to top off a wonderful Hamfest. Great food, great people, huge flea market, excellent vendors, big attendance and terrific banquet, doesn't get any better than that! I hope you were there.

The first sign of encouragement was listening to the talk-in station. With the number of stations calling in you could tell the attendance was going to be "okay", but I had no idea just how okay it would be. With the change of location, there was concern on how the Hamfest would turn-out. Changing a Hamfest location can drive attendance down, so can changing the date. The RARA Hamfest organizers were rightly concerned and were holding their collective breath. As soon as I saw the parking area, I said wow, this is great.

Best Call-In Station I've Ever Heard.

While driving onto Rochester I was listening to the call-in station and Brad (I don't know his callsign) was taking callsigns for the call-in raffle and giving out directions as fast as he could. Since I too needed directions the call-in station was much appreciated. The call-in station operators also gave out the PL tone frequency very often.

This is a lesson for all of you out there; announce the repeater PL tone very often. Don't expect everyone to know the PL off the top of their heads, especially those from out-of-town. During slow times announce your call often, let everyone know that someone is there to offer assistance.

The concession had a wide variety of food to choose from. I had the sausage and it was superb. Those Barnard fire department guys/gals sure know how to cook. Service was great and as fast as they could get you the food, you could sit down and eat, and the prices were very low and reasonable too. I heard a lot of comments on how good the food was and everyone was pleased with the low cost. The Barnard FD people were all smiles because they did very well with the concession, and if I read their minds correctly, they were thinking "these ham guys can eat"!

The outdoor flea market area was huge! I'm not sure how many tailgaters there were, several hundred by the looks of it, but there was a lot of terrific used equipment for sale. If you were looking for a good used HF radio, you had a lot to choose from. The indoor vendor space was decent and the club thought ahead and rented a very large tent for additional space for the commercial vendors. I spend time at each Hamfest talking to the out-of-town vendors, to thank them for coming to Western New York. They were very happy at the attendance and seemed pleased with the business coming their way. Or breakfast, I'm easy to please.

The Rochester Hamfest this year was truly exceptional and Thank You to the Rochester Amateur Radio Association (RARA) for sponsoring a great event.

Also, a big thank you to all of the other clubs in the Rochester area for supporting RARA, setting up your club booths and tents, and being there when RARA needed you! Thank you to RRRA, RDXA, RVHFG, Judy from the Buffalo NWS for SKYWARN, the RCA club, the Antique Wireless Association (AWA), and anyone else I can't remember for being there. The Hamfest was truly one we will remember for a long time.

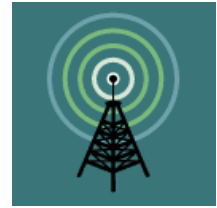

June 1998 Forecast

Flux Range 96-125

Summer approaches. Daytime MUF's are declining due to the heating and thinning of the ionosphere. Up to now, this has not adversely effected DX propagation. Late spring also brings us high MUF's at night. This is the time of year when daytime and nighttime MUF's approach each other and open paths which span areas of both day and night. This is especially noticeable at the peak of the solar cycle, when 15 Meters opens for worldwide propagation almost 24 hours a day.

We are still early in the cycle, but should look for unusual openings on the high bands because this is the season for them. With fluxes usually around 100, signals on 15 are still sparse. There are openings to Asia well after dark, and occasional signals from Europe in the afternoon. The east/west paths are fine, with VK/ZL coming through strong in the evening. Things will be much different with the flux goes above 150 - maybe next year.

17 Meters is more interesting. We are finding many of the same openings as on 20. Well into the evening we find polar openings and European sigs, along with the expected openings to the Pacific. Asian paths are open in the morning, including the high latitude path to southeast Asia. All these windows open on 15 at sunspot peaks, and 17 will also be much improved.

The thinning ionosphere is already effecting 10 & 12 Meters, which don't get much attention during the summer months. Daypath MUF's are at their lowest in July, which is a month of rapid deterioration for 15 Meter propagation. For now, we can enjoy the occasional nightpath signals on this band through June.

20 is open well past midnight nowadays. The path to Russia and Siberia is open through the evening, though ham radio activity in the CIS has dropped in recent years. The band just doesn't sound as busy anymore. The 20 Meter opening swings to Europe later in the evening as sunrise sweeps over that continent. This DX is workable well past midnight. In the morning 20 brings us awesome conditions to Asia - all of it. Westerly long path should also be watched in the morning. Most of this activity will be from South Africa.

High QRN levels have brought an end to most activity on 40 Meters and lower. The overheated ionosphere will soon be effecting all bands 15 and up. This leaves 17 and 20 Meters for most summer DX work.

Sporadic E season is with us now, bringing short skip to 6 & 10. Operation on 10 SSB requires an account with the 10-10 organization. The novices will tell you all about it if you don't have one. There is a fee, and I have often wondered if this was legal. <http://www.qth.com/ad5q/>

Forecast of Solar and Geomagnetic Activity

Forecast of Solar and Geomagnetic Activity

17 June - 13 July 2009 Solar activity is expected to be very low. No proton events are expected at geosynchronous orbit. The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at normal flux levels.

Geomagnetic field activity is expected to be at quiet levels during most of the period. However, there will be a chance for unsettled conditions during 30 June - 01 July. connditions are expected during 05 - 08 June.
