

Welcome...

If you thrill to the chase of rare DX, if pushing yourself and your station to the limits in contests is your game, if you are an "armchair" DX'er or contester, if you find the challenge and work of Field Day operations exciting, if you want to share your enthusiasm and hard-won knowledge in these fields with like-minded amateurs, then you belong in the Rochester DX Association.

DX = "distant exchange"; typically, a contact with a radio operator in a foreign country.

Founded in 1947 in Rochester, NY, RDXA is an Amateur Radio organization dedicated to the art and science of DX operating and contesting. RDXA has been an ARRL affiliated club since its founding. The club celebrated its 60th anniversary in 2007 and presently holds the callsign W2RDX. Club membership numbers approximately 80 amateurs in the Finger Lakes Region of Western New York (WNY). Interests of the members range from the obvious pursuits of HF DX'ing and contesting to satellite operating, restoration and operation of antique gear, QRP building and operating, RTTY, ATV and digital modes, VHF and microwave contesting...and more. Help for the newcomer and old-timer alike is a long-standing club tradition. If amateurs do it, you'll find it in the RDXA.

Club History

The Rochester DX Association was formed in the spring of 1947 when a number of active DX'ers in the area conceived the idea of holding informal dinner gettogethers for the purpose of discussing DX. It became apparent to the group that some form of organization would aid in the nourishment and preservation of the common interest in DX. A constitution was drafted and adopted in June 1947. The aim of the organization was not ambitious...more social than political. The experience of the old timers showed that a successful organization results from strong common interests and as little red tape as possible. The credentials for membership were chosen to insure the former and by-laws were drafted to keep the organization simple and flexible. The RDXA founders felt that they had laid the basis for a long lasting organization that would serve its members well. It would appear, over half a century later, that they found a good formula.

Organization

The Rochester DX Association is governed by its elected officers and a Board of Directors. Club officers are: President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. Club officers are also members of the Board of Directors. There are four additional elected Board members.

Membership is open to all licensed radio amateurs with a genuine interest in DX. ARRL Membership is suggested, but not required.

Regular Meetings

The Rochester DX Association holds formal meetings from September through June. Members convene on the 3rd Tuesday of the month, holidays excepted, 19:30 local time, currently at the Monroe County Emergency Operations Center, 1190 Scottsville Rd. The meeting venue is ADA-accessible. Check the RDXA website (www.rdxa.com) for updates.

The meeting format consists of a short business program

followed by reports from various committee chairmen. The feature program follows the reports and is a 30-40 minute presentation on some aspect of amateur radio. DXpedition videos, hints and kinks night, the annual DX Quiz are just a few of the subjects covered in recent feature programs.

In keeping with the social traditions of the Club, many members gather after the meeting at a nearby watering hole...usually the Scotch & Sirloin in Winton Place, but sometimes elsewhere (ask at the meeting). Here you'll find camaraderie, more tall tales of DX worked and lost, QSL's received and tips on routes to get that elusive one, antenna and rig discussions and more.

Bulletin


One of the benefits of RDXA membership is a subscription to the RDXA Newsletter. The Newsletter is published 10 times a year, September though June. A typical issue includes DX tips, listings of DX on the air, humorous ham anecdotes, member contest scores and standings, QSL route information, and more.

Hamfest

In recent years, the RDXA tent has become a fixture at the Rochester Hamfest and flea market. Members and non-members alike gather here throughout the event to swap tall tales of rare DX, have a bite to eat, or wet their whistle with a "cold 807" before venturing forth to hunt for radio junque and bargains. Often the visitor can find a QRP station in operation...chasing some casual DX or chewing the rag with stateside ops. Drop by at the next Rochester Hamfest and get acquainted. You'll find a friendly group of hams and a spot to rest your feet before resuming your hunt for that elusive bit of radio gear you just can't live without.

Field Day

Hard work, good food, sweat and radio madness are words which best describe an RDXA Field Day operation. Each year the Club mounts a 3A outing, plus GOTA and VHF / satellite stations. The location is Webster Park Campground. This site has proved near-perfect for a multi-transmitter effort. A 5-acre field is
